Tech Talk by Matt Carter

Matt reports that the Annual Toy and Hobby Fair trade event was a bit dismal this year, with many of the smaller companies not putting up much in the way of displays.

Model Engines were there, as well as Spektrum to name some of the more important ones. M.E. were showcasing some of the new models soon to be available from Seagull (est June/July) including .90 size Zeros and Spitfires.

Matt had a few models to check out, and a great new professional charger - although the name charger doesn't really do this beast justice.

As well as charging all well known battery types (max 5S currently), it also has ESC testing, motor RPM sensing (for sensor type motors), PC connection with USB, servo testing, digital servo programming and more.

The unit is called the Pulsar Touch. It has a touch screen display, and will take firmware updates in the future to enhance the number and types of supported devices.

As usual, the field was in great shape, but the showers and cold wind made the challenge tougher than it needed to be (speaking from a beginners point of view).






push rod, the control horn and the wire rod for all the world to see, not shown on the box it came in.

Next on the agenda engine nacelles and retracts.




